Fred E. Hayes was the eldest child born to Mr. & Mrs. Albert B. Hayes, January 1st, 1891 in Ness City, Kansas. Next to arrive was a daughter, ~~Setha~~ (Sitha) Frances in ~~the~~ 1892, Harry A. on October 12, 1894, Arlie Benjamin ~~was~~ born Dec. 24, 1896 and Nettie M. the last child was born 5 July 1898.

Albert Hayes had a cousin who was an engineering student at ~~Iowa State~~ in Ames, Iowa in the late 1880's who initially sparked the interest and planted the idea of the land of opportunity <sup>very</sup> in the west. But with a very young family he gave up his dreams of a westward move for a few years. However after the turn of the century his wife's family, that is her brother Andrew and Theresa, children and their married daughter and husband came west in 1906, settling in Grandview. <sup>wife</sup> ~~THELMA~~ <sup>WRIGHT</sup> AB. Hayes had made a trip west in 1904 to "get the lay of the land" and was told that probably within 3-4 years there would be some water available for irrigation. And, the man felt Grandview was <sup>most level</sup> the best site because its area had the best & fertile lands. Prasser and Meleton were busy R/R stations

but he felt Grandview would be the center or hub of the other communities. He returned to Kansas and made definite organization for an ultimate move to Washington.

Fred E. was in the 1<sup>st</sup> (Psal you might check this out for certain but I think he was in the 1<sup>st</sup> class and my mom in the 2<sup>nd</sup> graduating class from GHS.) After high school graduation Fred, who exhibited excellent and unusual talent as an artist went to school at the ~~the~~ state college Washington State. Inasmuch as he must help support himself there was greater opportunity for additional work & jobs so he went the next year to the U of Wash. His sister graduated from HS +  
the U of Wash. His sister went to State Normal School in Ellensburg this. Fred made a great name for himself at U of W journalism but more so with newspapers doing advertising sketches and drawings. ~~He became~~ Fred E. was elected to the Student body president at U of W. in 1915 but for benefit of future teaching desires he resigned and transferred to State Normal at Ellensburg. By odd coincidence the elected <sup>President of Associated</sup> Hayes Body President could not serve and rather than the vice president being moved to the position a special election was held and Fred E. Hayes was elected S.B. President of State Normal in 1916. and he and his sister Frances (Hayes) Ferneat graduated that same year.

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at this time Fred and Ferrie have graduated Harry is at Washington State studying history and music, Arlie B. is at the U of Washington where he studied aeronautical engineering and playing on the Husky varsity football team. Arlie graduated after the war, in 1924, and was associated with Boeing Airplane Co. Incidentally, Arlie (Cotton or "Cot" as he was called) was with Mr. Boeing and other notables on the 1st commercial air flight to Hawaii. In those early days the flights were patented <sup>as described</sup> from point to point by direction - degrees.

Europe war clouds extended westward and on Oct 6- 1917, Fred enlisted in Co #~~18th~~ Infantry. He trained at Ft. Lewis and was sent overseas in spring of 1917. He was reported missing in action 18 July 1918 and his body returned Dec. 24<sup>th</sup>, 1918. Herman Turley's brother was at the depot when the body (no one had informed the family of the pending arrival) arrived on Christmas eve. He asked the agent if he could stay with the body and spare the family the sudden grief or until the 26<sup>th</sup>. This request was given and (Paul I think his nickname was BUCK TURLEY but call Herman Turley &

ask him what his given name was altho he  
was known by Buck I feel sure).

Corporal Harry A. Hayes enlisted on 28 Nov  
1917. He served in the Quartermaster Corps in Ft.  
Lewis, Receiving Center, Camp Hancock, Georgia and  
Camp <sup>M</sup>Harrison, Virginia. He died Oct 22, 1918 at  
Camp Harrison, Virginia.

Arlie B. Hayes was Quartermaster 2nd class  
Naval Air Service entered on 18 Jan 1918 serving bases  
at San Diego, Corpus Christy, Tex, US Naval station at  
Kellingholme, England and Brest France. Arlie B  
Hayes was discharged 17 Jan 1919.

After the war and the establishment of an  
American Legion Post in Grandview - great effort  
was made and a drive begun for funds to build  
an American Legion Hall. Fred E. Hayes was selected  
as the person for whom the post was named. It is believed  
he was chosen because he was the eldest <sup>son</sup> of the Hayes's,  
he was a wonderful and popular man who exemplified  
the "soldier" ideals; he gave his life <sup>for</sup> the principles of  
America stands for, and perhaps as a tribute to a family  
who lost two of their three sons in the service. The  
Hayes family was happy and proud to have their son  
so edified by the <sup>construction</sup> building of the first American Legion  
Hall in the state of Washington. There were other AM  
Buildings that were rent or purchased but none that  
was specifically built or so dedicated as the American Legion Post

Hall in Grandview-Washington.
